
















Study Supports Old Claim –Beauty Requires Thought

oes the experience of beauty require a person to think? Such questions have long preoccupied philosophers like Immanuel Kant who claimed that beauty requires thought, unlike sensuous pleasure, which, he said, is never beautiful. Now, researchers say Kant was right on one count and wrong on the other.

Research findings show that distractions do indeed detract from the experience of beauty. In other words, it takes thought to experience beauty when looking at an image. And, evidence also shows that sensuous pleasures can be beautiful. "Strong pleasure and image beauty both require thought," says researcher Denis Pelli at New York University.

To explore these theories the new study asked 62 people to indicate how much pleasure and beauty they felt while they saw an image, tasted a can-

dy, or touched a soft teddy bear. Each person saw many different images, some beautiful, some merely nice, and others neutral, like a chair in a furniture catalog,

then rated each on a four-point scale.

Within the experiment, the same participants were then asked to repeat what they'd done earlier, only this time they were distracted with a secondary task. In that task, participants heard a series of letters and were asked to press a button any time they heard the same letter they'd heard two letters before.

Researchers found that the experience of non-beautiful objects wasn't

changed by distraction. But, distraction took away from the experience of beauty when shown an image earlier

researcher Brielmann said. "But for

deemed beautiful. In other words, Kant was right. Beauty does require thought.

However, contradicting Kant, about one third of participants said they'd definitely experienced sensual beauty after sucking on a candy or touching a soft teddy bear.

Surprised, the researchers decided to follow up. "Our findings show that many other things besides art can be beautiful -- even candy,"

the researchers say. Such scientific explorations of beauty have practical application as well.

"Art museum curators, for example, have known these important insights intuitively for years. You should not distract people if you want them to find beauty in the art," Brielmann adds.

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Q & A With Tim Grey





Is the Google Maps satellite map in Lightroom available for photographers to

Yes, it is. Go to the Map module and choose "Satellite" (or "Hybrid") from

the Map Style popup below the map display at the left side of the toolbar. If you don't see the toolbar press the "T" key on the keyboard to reveal (or to hide) the toolbar.

The default setting is "Road Map," which is basic. Switching to "Satellite" shows actual terrain features. The "Hybrid" setting shows both.

Also, a "Terrain" view option, similar to the "Road Map" view with topography has "Light" and "Dark" options to show two additional versions of the "Road Map."

I find the "Road Map" view the most helpful for sorting out the location you're looking at on the map. I find the "Satellite" option helpful for confirming specific location, since you can see terrain details as well as features such as buildings and roads with this view option.

I'm noticing that /the latest/ Photoshop is showing a magenta "tail" that follows my brush strokes when cleaning up a layer mask. Is this a bug, or what?

The latest update to Photoshop CC 2018 includes a smoothing feature for the various

brush tools, which can help prevent a jagged appearance when strokes aren't especially steady.

The feature can be enabled (or disabled) using the "Show Brush Leash While Smoothing" checkbox found on the Cursors tab of the Preferences dialog. Turn this checkbox off if you never want to see the leash when using a brush-based tool (the Brush or Pencil tools, for example).

Any value above 0% for the Smoothing setting on the Options bar will enable the feature. You can also adjust additional settings by clicking the settings popup.

The leash [shows] the direction and speed of each brush stroke, which helps to better understand the Smoothing feature and related controls.

Is there any point in bracketing if a single image histogram shows no clipping? Is there any possible benefit to creating a bracketed HDR version?

There is the potential for reduced noise in shadow areas even when no histogram clipping occurs in a single exposure.

Using HDR when it isn't necessarily critical, and expanding your bracket beyond the bare minimum for shadow detail, can be helpful.

This approach is best when you know you'll want to reveal considerable shadow detail in the final image. If you'll leave shadow areas relatively dark, [an HDR capture] can help hide noise that might otherwise be revealed.

[Ed Note: As many EPSers know who attended the NPPNW photo presentations in Albany last month, Robert O'Toole, the keynote presenter, verified what many Nikon D500 owners have already learned. Noise, even at unheard of high ISO settings, is a concern of the past with this new technology.]

New Selection Tool in Photoshop



[In the latest] Photoshop update, a magenta "tail" follows brush strokes when cleaning up a mask. Is this a bug?

PS CC 2018 includes a new smoothing feature [that] helps prevent jaggies when brush strokes aren't steady. Enable (or disable) by Clicking the checkbox for "Show Brush Leash While Smoothing" in the Cursors tab of Preferences. Click checkbox again to [remove]. [Give it a try before you do as this looks to be a huge time saver.

Any value above 0% for Smoothing (on the Options bar) enables the feature. [There are] additional adjustments for brush stroke smoothing by Clicking the Settings popup.


