

Q & A With Tim Grey



A Tim Grey Extra Extravaganza

This month we assemble three pages of Q's from folks just like EPSers with Tim's A's because his answers are always concise and helpful often in ways we didn't expect.

How do you make a black frame or border in Photoshop? Can it be done in Lightroom?

then, one Click for line color, one Click for line thickness, and you are Done!]

press Shift+O on the keyboard to cycle through variations of [a specific] op-



If you want a thin border around a photo, [called a "Keyline" in the printing industry], Adding a Stroke to any

image in Photoshop is easy [?!] and is also available when sharing photos in Lightroom via the Slideshow, Print, or Web modules.

In Photoshop Layers panel working on the Background layer, convert to a "normal" layer. Then Double-click the thumbnail for that image and click OK for New Layer in the dialog.

Next, click the "Add a Layer Style" button (the "fx" icon) at the bottom of the panel, and choose "Stroke" from the popup menu. Make sure the Position popup is set to "Inside" [to view] the effect. Note that this will cover [a small part of the edges] of the image. Then adjust Size and Color settings (among other options) [to finish] the border effect.

Lightroom has similar options within the Slideshow, Print, and Web modules. Turn on the Stroke Border checkbox within the [correct] module. Set the color (use the color swatch) and size (with the Width slider). Be aware this Stroke Border option is NOT available when exporting images from Lightroom. [What?]

[Ed note: If you use InDesign for layouts you are in luck. Everything you need for a keyline is in the double tool bars. Click the image(s),

Q:

When I crop a photo in Lightroom and then click and drag to center it, I see a spiral line similar

The spiral you're seeing is one of the [new] options for the Crop tool to help refine cropping a photo. [Multiple] options in the Tools > Crop Guide Overlay and the submenu [are now available].

Several different overlay options include Grid, Thirds, Diagonal, Triangle, Golden Ratio, Golden Spiral, and Aspect Ratios. These are helpful when cropping [an image to locate the center of interest with] reference to [some] of the "rules" [guidelines] of composition, such as the "Rule of Thirds".

From the Tool Overlay submenu you can choose Always Show, Never Show or, Auto Show if you want [the guides] to appear only when you are adjusting the crop bounding box.

[After] selecting a specific overlay from the Overlay submenu, pressing the letter "O" (as in "overlay") on the keyboard will cycle through the available options. [Then]



Is it possible to process videos in Photoshop CC?



Yes! You can. When you open a video clip in Photoshop, your initial impres-

sion may be that you've opened a still photo. The clue that you're working with a video clip is the Timeline panel presented automatically when a video is opened.

On the Timeline you can zoom in or out, move the play head slider back and forth to locate specific frames to be used for applying adjustments. Then apply creative filter effects just as though it were a still photo. In addition, you might, want to add adjustment layers to alter the appearance of the video.

When finished render a version of the video that includes all adjustments by clicking the Render Video button (the curved arrow icon), Choose a filename and location where you want to save the revised video.

All video adjustments can also be saved intact as a Photoshop PSD file to refine existing or add new adjustments at a later time.

In Lightroom

I preview [my work] without closing window?



Turn off "Show Selected Mask Overlay" with any targeted adjustment tools in

Lightroom by Clicking the toolbar checkbox below the image.

When working in Lightroom's Develop module, you have the option of displaying the translucent red overlay or [removing it] by turning off the "Show Selected Mask Overlay" checkbox. If you don't see that toolbar, press the letter "T" key to [make] visibility.

My preference is to keep this checkbox turned off [because] I find it easier to simply hover [the cursor] over the edit pin when I want [a quick look at] the mask overlay, rather than



Regarding keywords, could you advise on plurals and capitalization?



To me the most important aspects of a key-wording strategy are consistency and

(to the extent possible) simplicity.

First, don't worry about capitalization. You'll be able to search regardless of what the original capitalization was. [However], if I submit photos to stock photography services

I would tend to be more careful about capitalization for proper nouns.

[Second], for singular versus plural, I use singular unless the plural is noteworthy. My aim here is simplicity and consistency.

For example, photos of a single (whale), and other images [showing] a group (whales) it would be possible to see search results for both singular and plural keywords. [However], a single "cactus" and the plural "cacti" would not find all of the images you might be looking for.

You also need to consider whether you may ever need to search specifically for a photo containing multiple subjects, where you would want to be able to search specifically for the plural form of a keyword.

The best solution is to think about your own specific needs [then keep your] keyword [list] consistent



In Lightroom – how can you find the original folder for an image that is in a collection?



You can navigate to the source folder for any image in Lightroom by right-clicking

on the image and choosing "Go to Folder in Library" from the popup menu.

[*This*] command can be tremendously helpful in a variety of situations, after locating a particular image but don't know which folder [*it's*] in. Similarly, when searching for an image within the catalog it may not be clear which folder the image is in.

The "Go to Folder in Library"

command [goes] directly to the folder for the right-clicked image, highlights it on the list and is readily visible.



Using Adobe Camera Raw (ACR) in Photoshop CC, when processing images, RAW or not.

the changes [can be stored] for later access in ACR. In Lightroom, they [can only be] stored in [one non-ACR location]. Is this true and what are the details?



When processing in Lightroom, RAW captures are indeed preserved in an XMP

"sidecar" file, as [well as] in the Develop module.

Using the Camera Raw Filter directly in Photoshop, however, the settings are preserved only if using the Smart Filter. The exact same results [are achieved] when processing a raw capture by using either [tool].

To use a Smart Filter, first click on the thumbnail to select the Background image layer. Then choose Filter > Convert for Smart Filters that will convert it to a Smart Object.

Then choose Filter > Camera Raw Filter. When the Camera Raw dialog appears, apply any adjustments you'd like. When finished, click OK to apply the changes.

To refine adjustments later, simply double-click on the "Camera Raw Filter" text below the Smart Filters layer on the Layers panel. [*This*] brings up the existing adjustments for [*further*] refinement.

Can you explain how the Detail, Contrast, and Smoothness sliders work in Noise Reduction for

Adobe Camera Raw or Lightroom?

The Detail and Contrast sliders improve noise reduction in an image. The Smoothness

slider improves the fine-tune blending of any color artifacts [caused by the first two].

There is a Detail slider for both luminance and color noise reduction. [Each has] the same basic capability, just focused on luminance versus color noise. Increasing the value for Detail increases the threshold for when noise reduction is applied. With a higher value, detail will be preserved by not applying reduction as strongly along the edges.

The risk of increasing the value for Detail, however, is that noise may be revealed in the [smooth areas of an image. This can be especially problematic since the noise will appear in small areas (even individual pixels), causing it to stand out a bit more clearly.

The Contrast slider is only available for luminance noise reduction. If [previous] noise reduction is causing reduced mid-tone contrast, increase the value. Too high will cause splotchy artifacts [that] can be smoothed with a lower value. The need is to balance the setting without creating a mottled appearance [elsewhere].

The Smoothness slider is only available for color noise reduction, and it is focused on reducing artifacts that remain after applying [previous] noise reduction. In general it is

relatively safe to use a high setting for Smoothing.

The [results] of these refinements can be more easily seen if you apply strong noise reduction to an extremely noisy image. [Do this] as a test [to become] more familiar with actual effects on your photos.

I currently use Camera Raw for edit-

ing, but I would like to use Lightroom, IF I can find a way not

to give up my current file organization. Is this possible?

Yes! With Adobe Lightroom Classic CC you can maintain your existing folder structure.

However, with the new cloudbased Lightroom CC, your photos [must be] organized with a date-based folder structure.

[*This is*] the most common area of confusion related to Classic CC [vs. the new CC version that syncs with the cloud]. Imported photos [using the Classic version are added to the catalog without moving or copying to a different location, the same approach you've been using.

In the new Lightroom CC [using Cloud-based synchronization of all photos does not maintain existing folder structures. Instead, it [requires] a date-based folder system.

Therefore, [if you] want to [continue] managing [your] own folder structure, Lightroom Classic CC, [is] the better choice.

Can you recommend an app for the iPhone that provides long exposures?

The app I've been using is called "Slow Shutter" by Cogitap Software. In addition, if you have upgraded to iOS 11 or later you can create a similar effect using

The "Slow Shutter" app enables a fair amount of control over creative effects [including] using this app to capture long exposures in real time.

the Live Photo feature.

In iOS 11 the iPhone can now create a long exposure effect using the Live Photo feature [where] the icon looks something like a target, with several concentric circles that [appear] yellow when activated.

After capturing, review that image in the Photos app. Then swipe up from the bottom to bring up Details of the image. Under the Effects heading [stroke] through the options, and choose "Long Exposure."

In both cases the image you capture isn't truly a long exposure, but rather a composite created from multiple frames blended together.
