New Proposed EPS Score Definitions

Current EPS Definitions:

- Score 0 Disqualifies a judge from scoring his or her own image or that of a family member. The score will be the average of other two scores.
- Score 1 Image is entered in an inappropriate category and may be reentered in another category.
- Score 2 Image is disqualified for having been previously entered.
- Score 3 Image's technical imperfections overwhelm the content.
- Score 4 Image has more than one distracting element.
- Score 5 Image has unclear subject matter, restricted content, or technical weakness.
- Score 6 Image has interesting content and technical competence.
- Score 7 Image has strong content and technical expertise.
- Score 8 Image has unique content, strong design elements, and technical excellence.
- Score 9 Image is worthy of being considered for an award in annual competition. No design or technical fault can be found.

Proposed EPS Definitions- Sept. 2018 (No changes suggested for scores 0, 1 & 2)

- Score 3 The image is dominated by its flaws. A judge's reaction may be "this was a mistake or I'm missing something."
- Score 4 The image has more than one distracting element and few strengths. A judge's reaction may be "oops."
- Score 5 The image has obvious strengths that are outweighed by noticeable weaknesses. A judge's reaction may be "would have been good except...."
- Score 6 An image with noticeable strengths that just offsets obvious problems. It is an image showing the basic competence expected of an active club member. A judge's reaction may be "an ok image."
- Score 7 The image is strong and required advanced skill or contains an outstanding element. There are minor but noticeable flaws in the image. A judge's reaction may be "good image."
- Score 8 The image elicits a strong viewer response because all the elements work so well together. There are almost no weaknesses or distractions but the image falls slightly short of the best. A judge's reaction may be "outstanding."
- Score 9 The image is exceptionally strong, true artistic excellence. All aspects work together. It need not be a perfect image, just very strong. It is an image that will stay with you for days or weeks. A judge's reaction may be "bravo, terrific!"

"World's Fastest Camera" 10 Trillion FPS


esearchers from Quebec University's Institute National de la Recherche Scientifique (INRS) and the California Institute of Technology (Caltech), have developed the world's fastest camera capable of capturing 10 trillion frames per second. On the other hand, an average smartphone camera manages to capture around 30 per second.

Dubbed as T-CUP, the new device is so quick that it literally makes it possible to freeze time to see phenomena such as light itself behave in extremely slow motion.

This camera represents a fundamental shift, making it possible to analyze interactions between light and matter at an unparalleled temporal resolution.

According to the team, T-CUP has set a world record for real-time imaging speed and could be used to power a new generation of microscopes for biomedical, materials science, and other applications.

"It's an achievement in itself. But we already see possibilities for increas-

ing the speed to up to one quadrillion frames per second. Speeds like that are sure to offer insight into as-yet undetectable secrets of the interactions between light and matter," says Jinyang Liang, the leading author of this work, who was an engineer in COIL when the research was conducted.

Graphene Based Camera Can See The Invisible

he first graphene-based camera has now been developed and is capable of imaging visible light with ultra violet (UV) and infrared (IR) light simultaneously.

Researchers have for the first time demonstrated that integration of a CMOS circuit with graphene, results in a high-resolution image sensor consisting of hundreds of thousands of photo-detectors, thus creating a digital camera that is highly sensitive to UV, IR and visible light at the same time. In general, this opens a wide range of possible optoelectronic applications, such as low-power optical data communications with compact and ultra sensitive sensing systems.

The easy and cheap to fabricate camera is also easily integrated onto flexible substrates that will be useful for many applications such as night vision, fire control, vision under extreme weather conditions, applications, that range from safety, security, low cost cameras, fire control systems,

night surveillance cameras, automotive sensor systems, medical imaging applications, food and pharmaceutical inspection to environmental monitoring, to name a few.

This project is currently incubating in Institute of Photonic Sciences
Launchpad where the team is working to bring this breakthrough along with full patents for imaging and sensing technologies to the market.

Q & A With Tim Grey





I downloaded Aurora HDR 2019 and my question is how can I get a photo from Light-

room to Aurora to edit then bring it back to Lightroom?

To use Aurora HDR 2019 from Lightroom, it first needs to be installed as a plug-in. Next, select the captures you want to merge into an HDR image. Then go to the menu and navigate to File > Edit With Preset, where you can select "Open Source Files" from the submenu under the "Aurora HDR 2019" heading.

You mentioned that with a very long exposure moving subjects in a scene might disap-

pear altogether. Could this be a way to have people in a scene not appear in a photo?

Yes, indeed! Provided there is enough movement of the people during an extended exposure, a long exposure can provide a method for having the people disappear from a scene in your photograph.

I get this error message when exporting a catalogue: "Lightroom encountered an

error when reading from its preview cache and needs to quit."

This error message indicates that the previews file has become corrupted. You will need to delete the previews and have Lightroom rebuild them.

I went to a trip folder from several years ago, looking for videos captured during that trip.

These videos work fine when accessing them from my operating system, but Lightroom puts a black exclamation point icon on each thumbnail. With my cursor over it, a message says "Lightroom has encountered problems reading this video." How can I get my videos back in Lightroom?

This scenario most likely indicates the cache for video files has become corrupted. To purge the cache so it can be rebuilt, click the "Purge Cache" button in the Video Cache Settings of the Performance tab in the Preferences dialog in Lightroom. When you restart Lightroom the videos should perform normally again.

I installed all updates to my Adobe Creative Cloud applications, including Light-

room and Photoshop. I see new features in Lightroom, but Photoshop doesn't reflect any of the features for the new update. But the Creative Cloud applications shows that I've updated. Why can't I get the new features if I've updated Photoshop?!

The latest (October 2018) release of Photoshop is actually a major update to a "2019" edition, replacing the 2018 edition. However, it is installed as a separate application, so you'll need to be sure to launch the 2019 version to see the new features.
